## STATE'S REPLY TO DEFENDANT ALEC BALDWIN'S RESPONSE AND HANNAH GUTIERREZ' RESPONSE TO THE STATE'S MOTION FOR USE IMMUNITY

The State of New Mexico, through Special Prosecutors Kari T. Morrissey and Erlinda O. Johnson, respectfully submit the following in reply to the responses of Alec Baldwin and Hannah Gutierrez to the State's Motion for Use Immunity.

#### **FACTS**

1. After the shooting of Halyna Hutchins by Alec Baldwin, Hannah Gutierrez provided several statements to include a statement to law enforcement on November 9, 2021, and another statement to OSHA investigators on December 16, 2021. In the statement provided November 9, 2021, Ms. Gutierrez waived her Fifth Amendment privilege with the assistance of her attorney, Jason Bowles, and made numerous statements that the State now seeks to use in its case in chief against Alec Baldwin. In the statement provided on December 16, 2021, Ms. Gutierrez attended the meeting with OSHA investigators with Mr. Bowles and questions concerning her Fifth Amendment privilege were never discussed or raised. The statements the State seeks to introduce do not inculpate Ms. Gutierrez; they are statements of Ms. Gutierrez that inculpate Mr. Baldwin.

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- 2. On February 6, 2024, the State listed Hannah Gutierrez as a witness on its witness list (contrary to Mr. Nikas' assertion on page 2 of his response). *See* State's Exhibit 1. The State filed an amended witness list on April 3, 2024, that did not list Ms. Gutierrez as a witness. The defendant filed an amended witness list on April 19, 2024, that listed Ms. Gutierrez as one of the defendant's witnesses. *See* State's Exhibit 2. The defendant then filed a subsequent witness list on May 6, 2024, that also listed Ms. Gutierrez as a witness for the defendant. *See* State's Exhibit 3.
- 3. All witness lists filed by the defendant contained a notice that the defendant reserved the right to call any witness disclosed by the State. The defendant has already begun serving subpoenas on the State's witnesses for the upcoming trial, so presumably the defendant agrees that when he notified the State of his intention to call witnesses disclosed by the State, he is free to call those witnesses. *See* State's Exhibit 4.
- 4. On May 6, 2024, the State filed an addendum to its witness lists and notified the defendant that the State was reserving the right to call any witnesses listed on the defendant's witness list. *See* State's Exhibit 5. Hannah Gutierrez is among those witnesses. It is worth noting that Zac Sneesby is also among those witnesses, and he too would offer substantial testimony that inculpates Mr. Baldwin. The defendant has motioned the Court to exclude his testimony despite the fact that he is on the defendant's witness list and has completed a pretrial interview.
- 5. During a zoom meeting prior to May 5, 2024, undersigned counsel was aware that Ms. Gutierrez was being scheduled for a pretrial interview and asked defense counsel, Heather LeBlanc, during an unrecorded break during a pretrial interview if Ms. Gutierrez would be asserting her Fifth Amendment privilege or actually answering questions.

Undersigned counsel made this inquiry because she was trying to determine how much time to set aside for Ms. Gutierrez's interview. Ms. LeBlanc responded that Ms. Gutierrez would be answering questions. This caused counsel to believe that there was no need for use immunity given that the privilege was not going to be asserted, as Ms. Gutierrez had previously waived her Fifth Amendment privilege on numerous occasions.

- 6. On May 5, 2024, undersigned counsel emailed Mr. Bowles, regarding the interview of Ms. Gutierrez and her willingness to answer questions and was notified that Ms. Gutierrez intended to assert her Fifth Amendment privilege. Undersigned counsel explained to Mr. Bowles that Ms. LeBlanc previously seemed to indicate that Ms. Gutierrez was not intending to assert her privilege against self-incrimination. See State's Exhibit 6. Mr. Bowles confirmed that she would assert her privilege but also agreed that the privilege could not properly be asserted to all questions because some questions do not expose Ms. Gutierrez to criminal liability. See State's Exhibit 7.
- 7. Ms. Gutierrez's interview was initially scheduled for May 10, 2024, but was then rescheduled to May 9, 2024, due to Mr. Bowles' schedule. *See* State's Exhibit 8. The interview on May 9, 2024, was also cancelled due to Mr. Bowles' schedule. *See* State's Exhibit 9. Undersigned counsel then took steps to reschedule the interview herself through the prison where Ms. Gutierrez is housed and the interview finally took place on May 14, 2024. *See* State's Exhibit 10. During the interview Ms. Gutierrez asserted her privilege to numerous questions that arguably did not expose Ms. Gutierrez to criminal liability. *See* State's Exhibit 12.
- 8. On the evening of May 14, 2024, undersigned counsel emailed Mr. Bowles and indicated that undersigned counsel intended to ask the Court for use immunity for Ms. Gutierrez.

- Mr. Bowles responded the same evening that use immunity would "take care of any issues" but that he wanted to think about it overnight. Mr. Bowles indicated that he would confirm his position with undersigned counsel the following day. Mr. Bowles never followed-up with undersigned counsel as he stated he would and ultimately the State filed the motion or use immunity. *See* State's Exhibit 11.
- 9. Undersigned counsel submits that her motion for use immunity is not untimely.

  Undersigned counsel was initially under the impression that Ms. Gutierrez was not going to assert her Fifth Amendment privilege and was later under the impression that she would only assert her Fifth Amendment privilege to questions that actually expose her to criminal culpability. Ms. Gutierrez has been listed on the State's witness list (*See* State's Exhibit 1), the defendant's witness list(s) (*See* State's Exhibits 2 and 3) and both parties have reserved the right to call witnesses listed on the other party's witness list. *See* State's Exhibits 1, 2 and 3. Ms. Gutierrez submitted to a pretrial interview on May 14, 2024, wherein the defendant's counsel did not ask a single question of Ms. Gutierrez. *See* State's Exhibit 12.
- 10. On June 3, 2024, undersigned counsel filed her motion asking the Court to grant Ms. Gutierrez use immunity.

#### **ARGUMENT**

Before the Court can determine whether use immunity should be granted, the Court first needs to determine whether the questions that will be posed to Ms. Gutierrez during Mr. Baldwin's trial trigger her Fifth Amendment privilege. If they do not, then use immunity is not an issue and Ms. Gutierrez simply must testify truthfully under penalty of perjury. "The trial judge must make a proper inquiry into the legitimacy and scope of the witness' assertion of his

Fifth Amendment privilege. A blanket assertion of the privilege without inquiry by the court, is unacceptable." *United States v. Goodwin*, 625 F.2d 693 at 701 (1980).

"The constitutional protection against self-incrimination has long been "confined to real danger and does not extend to remote possibilities out of the ordinary course of law." *Heike v. United States*, 227 U.S. 131, 144, 57 L. Ed. 450, 33 S. Ct. 226 (1913). In the seminal case of *Hoffman v. United States*, 341 U.S. 479, 95 L. Ed. 1118, 71 S. Ct. 814 (1951), the Supreme Court opined, however, that "the privilege afforded not only extends to answers that would in themselves support a conviction . . . but likewise embraces those which would furnish a link in the chain of evidence needed to prosecute the claimant." *Id* at 486.

In the instant case, the State seeks information from Hannah Gutierrez regarding the criminal culpability of Alec Baldwin. During her pretrial interview on May 14, 2024, Ms. Gutierrez was asked what it was like to work with Mr. Baldwin – was he easy to work with or difficult to work with. Ms. Gutierrez asserted Fifth Amendment Privilege. Ms. Gutierrez was also asked if she conducted a firearms training with Mr. Baldwin and was asked follow-up questions about what the training consisted of. Ms. Gutierrez asserted her Fifth Amendment privilege to all questions regarding the training. See State's Exhibit 12, page 3 of 8. Ms. Gutierrez was asked if Mr. Baldwin was attentive during the training, using his cell phone, making any videos or FaceTiming family members during the training and Ms. Gutierrez asserted her Fifth Amendment privilege to these questions which seemingly do not encroach on her Fifth Amendment privilege at all. See State's Exhibit 12, page 4 or 8. Ms. Gutierrez was asked if Mr. Baldwin's holster was available for the training and whether she discussed a subsequent training session with Mr. Baldwin and Ms. Gutierrez asserted her Fifth Amendment privilege. Ms. Gutierrez also asserted her Fifth Amendment privilege to questions regarding

whether Mr. Baldwin rushed her, whether he was "in charge" of the movie set and whether she initially offered Mr. Baldwin a fake gun on October 21, 2021, to rehearse with. *See* State's Exhibit 12, pages 5 and 7. Most of these questions were freely answered by Ms. Gutierrez during previous interviews after she waived her Fifth Amendment privilege and voluntarily gave statements to law enforcement and OSHA investigators in 2021.

The State is asking the Court to determine the questions to which Ms. Gutierrez can assert her Fifth Amendment privilege under the law. For those questions that the Court determines she has a valid right to assert her Fifth Amendment privilege she should be granted use immunity and be ordered to testify. Ms. Gutierrez possesses highly inculpatory information about Mr. Baldwin and the jury's role is a truth-seeking role that should not be infringed upon.

Ms. Gutierrez previously stated that Mr. Baldwin was not supposed to be cocking the gun or pulling the trigger during the rehearsal that resulted in Ms. Hutchins' death. *See* State's Exhibit 13, page 130 and State's Exhibit 14, page 54. Ms. Gutierrez previously stated that Mr. Baldwin was largely inattentive during her firearms training with him and was speaking to family members on the phone, sending text messages and making videos for his children during the training. *See* State's Exhibit 13, page 65 and State's Exhibit 14, pages 32-33. Ms. Gutierrez previously stated that she instructed Mr. Baldwin during the training session not to point the gun at others, keep his finger off the trigger and out of the trigger guard. *See* State's Exhibit 13, page 67 and State's Exhibit 14, page 33. Ms. Gutierrez told law enforcement that because Mr. Baldwin was a producer on the film, he "kind of does whatever he wants so the other producers have to reel him in all the time." *See* State's Exhibit 13, page 151. Ms. Gutierrez explained to OSHA investigators that Mr. Baldwin was not available for the firearms training with the other actors. *See* State's Exhibit 14, page 31. In a text message dated October 17, 2021, after a day of

filming where Mr. Baldwin had numerous outbursts, Ms. Gutierrez described him to a fellow crew member as "crazy." *See* State's Exhibit 15. Finally, in a recorded jail call Ms. Gutierrez indicated that she offered a fake gun for the rehearsal on October 21, 2021. *See* call 10.36.101.213-ac31b0070a2465d567f62ed3daead40d previously provided to defense counsel.

The jury is entitled to hear all of the admissible evidence and testimony and give the witness's testimony the weight they think it deserves. The jury's role is one of truth-seeking and as such the jury should not be deprived of reliable and probative evidence. *State v. Trujillo*, 131 N.M. 709; 2002-NMSC-005; 42 P.3d 814 (2002). *See* also *Stenson v. Edmonds*, 2022 U.S. Dist. LEXIS 240599, 7, 2022 WL 19299121 (the court found that certain witnesses should be compelled to testify in accordance with the jury's truth-seeking role), *See* also *Tenn v. St.* 471 U.S. 409; 105 S. Ct. 2078; 85 L. Ed. 2d 425 (1985) (the court found that the it was permissible for the State to present a co-conspirators confession in its rebuttal case because failure to do would have impeded the jury's truth-seeking function).

In his response to the State's Motion for Use Immunity, Mr. Baldwin asserted that he is somehow prejudiced by the granting of use immunity to Ms. Gutierrez. Mr. Baldwin and his counsel have been aware of Ms. Gutierrez's inculpatory statements concerning Mr. Baldwin's conduct for more than two years. Every statement the State intends to elicit from Ms. Gutierrez was previously made and provided to the defendant. The defense never notified the State that Ms. Gutierrez was intending to assert her Fifth Amendment privilege upon listing her on their witness list and scheduling a pretrial interview – if fact, defense counsel stated to undersigned counsel that Ms. Gutierrez would answer questions posed during the interview. Moreover, Mr. Bowles agreed that Ms. Gutierrez would not give a blanket assertion of her Fifth Amendment privilege during the interview but instructed his client to do just that. Mr. Bowles indicated to

undersigned counsel that her suggestion of use immunity for his client seemed to address his concerns and then nearly four weeks later filed a response in opposition (likely changing his position after speaking to counsel for the defendant). Ms. Gutierrez is on the defendant's witness list and has completed a pretrial interview and can be subject to a follow-up interview prior to trial to satisfy the defendant's concerns.

In her response to the State's Motion for Use Immunity, Ms. Gutierrez cited to Hoffman v. United States, 341 U.S. 479 (1951) in support of her argument against the granting of immunity. However, Hoffman was not a case that dealt with use immunity, it simply explained the scope of a defendant's Fifth Amendment privilege but does not stand for proposition that the jury should be deprived of probative and material testimony with a grant of use immunity. Similarly, Ms. Gutierrez relied on State v. Belanger, 146 N.M. 357. In Belanger the Court found that the defendant could motion the Court for use immunity for a witness and the Court could order use immunity over the State's objection. Belanger does not support Ms. Gutierrez's argument against immunity, rather it supports the granting of immunity when it is opposed by the other party, as in the instant case. Ms. Gutierrez asserted in her response that somehow her testimony in the Baldwin trial would expose her to heightened criminal culpability in her pending case due to the high-profile nature of the case against Mr. Baldwin. Ms. Gutierrez seemed to assert that she would be unable to obtain a fair trial in her pending case for a completely unrelated incident if she were to appear to Mr. Baldwin's trial and testify truthfully regarding the culpability of Mr. Baldwin. If there was any real danger that Ms. Gutierrez would be unable to get a fair trial in her pending case, there is a remedy under the law – change of venue. Ms. Gutierrez is free to file a motion for change of venue if she is able to demonstrate that her fear is based in reality.

Ms. Gutierrez also argued that, assuming she wins her appeal and she is granted a new trial, she will be prejudiced by the statements made during Mr. Baldwin's trial during a possible retrial. Ms. Gutierrez claimed that "once the statements are out of the bag – their origin is irrelevant." However, any statement that could potentially incriminate Ms. Gutierrez is already out of the bag. Ms. Gutierrez provided four statements after the death of Ms. Hutchins (on scene to numerous law enforcement officers at varying times, two to law enforcement three weeks apart and one to OSHA investigators) two of which were in the presence of her counsel who wishes to convince this court that Ms. Gutierrez's statements are somehow secret. Ms. Gutierrez's statements were played to the jury during her trial which was also viewed by millions of people online and rehashed in countless news stories. This argument is nonsensical given that the State wants to extract testimony from Ms. Gutierrez that is inculpatory to Mr. Baldwin, not Ms. Gutierrez.

Ms. Gutierrez claimed that if the Court were to grant use immunity the State would be "given a free pass to cross-examine her on any topic it wanted." This simply is not how evidence and testimony occur at trial. Neither party is ever given a free pass to ask about any topic. The Court can limit the State's questioning of Ms. Gutierrez to specific questions about Baldwin's culpability and can afford Mr. Baldwin's attorneys adequate room to question her about her own culpability in the death of Ms. Hutchins that give rise to Mr. Baldwin's defense with regard to proximate cause. The vast majority of this testimony is out in the public already – Ms. Gutierrez admitted to loading the gun, identified the box of dummy ammunition she was pulling rounds from that was later matched to a photo of rounds provided by her father, left guns unattended and did not conduct proper safety checks of the guns. Moreover, Mr. Baldwin's attorneys fully intend to elicit all testimony that Ms. Gutierrez provided to law enforcement that

inculpates her, they just intend to illicit it in a vacuum under the exception to the prohibition against hearsay pertaining to statements against interest and the world will be watching. The world will be watching whether the Court allows the State an opportunity to ask its questions of Ms. Gutierrez or only permits Mr. Baldwin to elicit one-sided testimony in a vacuum. The effect on Ms. Gutierrez is the same – her incriminating statements will be aired during yet another high-profile trial. There is no constitutional injury to Ms. Gutierrez by the State's extraction of inculpatory statements about Mr. Baldwin's conduct by Ms. Gutierrez. The injury comes from Mr. Baldwin's right to present exculpatory evidence related to Ms. Gutierrez's criminal conduct that tends to lessen his own culpability, but Mr. Baldwin is entitled to present his defense. None of the defendants' arguments hold water against the truth-seeking and fact-finding mission of the jury during a trial. The jury must be given all of the facts about Mr. Baldwin's conduct, both inculpatory and exculpatory.

WHEREFORE, for the foregoing reasons, the State respectfully renews it's request for the granting of use immunity for Hannah Gutierrez and an order requiring her to testify under penalty of perjury.





I was cleaning a couple of them and a couple of them did have some issues that I couldn't figure out, so I sent them back to Seth and he sent them back to me and they were okay.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. So any type of like malfunction or anything that you came across would go  $-\-$ 

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah, yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: And you're talking about Seth Kenney, right?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: And I sent back one of the guns because the hammer was pulled back and it wouldn't really stack down, and I don't know he said something about I cleaned it wrong or something. I'm not sure, but I cleaned 17 other pistols that day. So I don't know how I did that one wrong.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. Do you remember which one that was?

MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, that was, actually, one of Miller's guns and not related to the incident, really, but Miller was one of the deputies and just one of his -- the hammer got stuck back, and I've never encountered that before that so --

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: -- went ahead and sent it back.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. So as far as like the movie productions go, do they require you to have any certifications to work? And they can be like anything.

MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, I'm not really sure entirely just because most of the jobs like that have just been like through word of mouth and everything or like, you know, Seth worked on getting them for me or my dad gets them for me. Or my dad got me on as his assistant the first time, you know. So I'm not really sure entirely what they are looking for.

I know that they get a firearm's license and everything and a license for the area to shoot on and everything. But they usually get that. I don't even get that usually so --

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: -- I'm not really sure in terms of what else. I know that Seth always tells me that I'm on his license to work with these weapons and that's all I really know.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: And that's kind of the same with Sarah, right?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. I'm not really sure what that's ever meant. Seth always just says Hannah and Sarah are on my license.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. But as far as like you go, there's no --

MS. GUTIERREZ: No one really asks about much of that.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Like you don't have to take safety classes in regards to anything with movie sets?

MS. GUTIERREZ: So that's the thing, I was, actually, just getting into the union. And with the union and everything, because on this set they hired me non-union. But, normally, with the unions, you take a safety course, you take a sexual harassment course, and you take a few different things.

And I had like literally just gotten the paperwork and everything to get in that, and you need

30 union days on a union show before you can do that 1 2 and so I had 22 before this job. And so a lot of the 3 days from this job were going to count towards that. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. 4 5 MS. GUTIERREZ: But, yeah, so I wasn't even able to get that. But for -- other than that, like 6 7 the -- the whole industry doesn't really require 8 anything. It's mostly just California or union, and I 9 wasn't union. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. And so Rust 10 11 doesn't like, you know -- like I, obviously, have to 12 have a cert to be a cop. 13 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. No, totally. 14 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: And it's like, you 15 know, every year, I gotta take like driving courses and 16 shooting courses and everything like that. 17 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah, no, totally. Yeah, no, Rust didn't really ask me anything about that. 18 19 They kind of just is conferred it all through that of 20 Seth. 21 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. So I heard that you were hired to do a couple jobs on this set? 22 23 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yes.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Can you talk about --

MS. GUTIERREZ: Okay. So like, originally, when I got on the set, you know, I've like always done armorer kind of really separate from props. Like I'm always with props, but usually, we do it ourselves me and my dad and props isn't really interfered.

This is the only job that I've taken where I was heavily incorporated into props and it's because, originally, they had hired me for armorer and key prop assistant. And that's not just like prop assistant that's the key prop assistant. So that means more responsibility, that means I'm Sarah's second -
DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: -- in a lot of cases. So if there's an issue with props, you would go to Sarah and then if there's an issue -- the -- where Sarah can't, you know, isn't there, then it goes to me and then we have our assistant, Nicole.

So I had -- my job is the armorer, and originally, I thought that I was mostly gonna be doing my armorer job and kind of left alone to do that. But after the first week, I got talked to by some people in production, and they were told that I wasn't really pulling my weight in props. So, basically, I was told that I needed to shift my focus less on armorer and more onto props.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Who did they expect to take on the armorer role if it wasn't your --

MS. GUTIERREZ: I don't know. They told me -- they said, yeah, we hear that you're taking your armorer job very seriously, but we need you to support props right now because props is also struggling. And I was like, okay. I'll try my best to do that. And they said, normally, before that, I would kind of just hang out in the prop truck and like, you know, work on the guns and just kind of be in there doing my own stuff if the -- if there weren't any guns on set.

But after that, they had told me like, no, we want you on set. We want you as a present on set for props.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. So it was split up quite a bit.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Can you give me some examples of what you would do like when you were assisting props?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Okay. Yeah. So, normally, you know, I kind of -- like for the saloon scene, I would just kind of be standing there, you know, watching over the guns and everything, checking them for the actors as I had brought them into the actors.

That's just my job as the armorer.

With the saloon and everything, I'm pouring drinks for props. I'm running outside and rolling cigarettes. I'm like doing several different things and grabbing several different props and setting props up constantly.

And so, yeah, when some things aren't exactly super prop heavy and sometimes they're just kind of gun heavy, and so in that case, I can like focus more on the guns but sometimes I was split between running the guns and also dealing with the props.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: But Nicole, the assistant, tried to help alleviate that a little bit but not every, you know, she's -- she was pretty green so had to step in a lot.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. Mostly, I thought that I was there doing props at the beginning just to help find everything. Because we got hired on a week before. Normally, you hire the prop master a month in advance. Sarah got brought on a week before; I got brought on a little after her.

And so we were just kind of running around

that first week trying to find -- find props. And then I thought after that, you know, after she got the assistant, I'd be able to focus more on the guns but then production talked to me and said that I needed to focus more on props so -
DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. And who from

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. And who from production?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Gabrielle Pickle and also the head of the art department, Brian, mostly, yeah, Sarah just said that I couldn't really support props in the way I needed, so they were talking about possibly taking -- I was talking to them and I was like, well, do you not want me to do props at all in this case and just focus on the guns? And they were like no. Like we don't want Nicole stepping up and taking your position.

We want you to step into this position, and we think it's a great opportunity for you, but, really, I just got to do two jobs for less pay.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: How you did you feel about that added responsibility?

MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, it was a lot.

But I'm super eager and when someone kind of says like,

you know, you can do this. Like then I'm just like, okay, now, I have to show them like I can do this.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah.

MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, so, ultimately, it was frustrating, but at the same time, I was like. All right. Gotta go and kick ass in props now, I guess, too.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah. Did you ever have like any time that, specifically, pointed out to where you felt overwhelmed?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Well, you know, props -- we were told a lot, you know, that we were kind of lagging and like the wranglers would kind of shit on us for not propping up horses soon enough or like not getting actors propped up soon enough.

So props was definitely struggling. And then after that talk I had with Brian, I went to Sarah and I was like I'm not like pulling my weight, you know. And I tried to talk to her about it. And she was like, yeah, I didn't mean to like be a jerk about it. I just wanted to let them know that I needed more help in the department.

And so we talked about it. And I was like, well, that's cool. Just maybe next time go ahead and talk to me first before going to Brian and Gabrielle.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Do you know why they didn't utilize Nicole more?

MS. GUTIERREZ: They -- well, you know, we definitely did utilize Nicole. But, ultimately, I have a very strong personality, and also a lot of the times, like my personality would even be stronger than Sarah's in a lot of respect.

And a lot of people were already kind of gaining respect for me like in terms of like, you know, the wranglers and everything, and I'm just good at meshing with other departments.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, so they wanted me on set more just to kind of, you know, be a presence of props and really, you know, kind of just be a demanding force.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Did you ever express to them at any point that you felt overwhelmed? Or --

MS. GUTIERREZ: After that, you know, I thought we were doing pretty good of managing both.

There were some days, you know, where I would talk to Sarah, and I was like -- like she would be like could you come out here and see what's going on with me? And

I was like, no, dude, I need to like focus on guns, and
I need to pull guns for later on.

And she would be like, well, you're the

And she would be like, well, you're the second; I think you should be here with me on set to watch this. And I was like, there's not a lot of props out there; I'm going to be here doing the guns.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: So there was a couple of times that I also kind of really held my ground on not, you know, spreading myself too incredibly thin.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Or getting overran by others?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. Yeah, exactly.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Because you kind of just have to. You know, but, ultimately, with higher positions, sometimes you get ran over.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. Who hired you 19 for Rust?

MS. GUTIERREZ: I believe -- I'm not really sure. Seth just texted me. He's like you got the job, prop assistant, so and so. I sent him my resume and they -- Sarah sent it in, and I think Row approved it, and, yeah, so Sarah -- Sarah hired me, Row approved it.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. So it's not like

a typical hiring for a job where you have to go in and --

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. No. There's no -there's no real interviews like any time in film. Film
is a very weird industry.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Word of mouth.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Word of mouth, by all means. I think it's so weird how like secretive it is almost. You know, like it's really hard to get on anything unless you know somebody. And if you stop working for a while, it's like almost hard to jump back in it.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. It's really weird you can't just like look up like film jobs in your area and then go and apply. It's not --

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Indeed.

MS. GUTIERREZ: That's not a thing. Yeah. I really wish it was kind of like that. That would probably -- yeah, that be a lot better. But, right now, there's just such a media surge, especially that, you know, they're just kind of getting on anyone that they can bring, really. Because the media surge with all of these different like the networks and everything coming out with their own little internet things, it's

1 making everything like boom right now like crazy. 2 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah. I know you had 3 talked about how you were in the process of becoming a union member. 4 5 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: With which union? 6 MS. GUTIERREZ: I was working on becoming a 7 8 union member with the Local 44. 9 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. 10 MS. GUTIERREZ: That's the oldest and 11 longest establishing and it's also the one that my 12 dad's a part of so --13 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Is that like international? Or --14 15 MS. GUTIERREZ: I'm not really entirely sure. I know it's mostly California. You know, each 16 17 union is kind of specific to the area. Yeah. I think that one is the most put together one. That's why they brought in the third person because, ultimately, Sarah would have to leave set pretty much every day for several hours and then it would just be me out there.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: And what would Sarah do at that time?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Sarah would go try to find props. Because with them bringing her in a week, you know, it's hard to find like a weird Indian ax, you know. Like, there's a bunch of weird obscure things for a period piece that are super hard to find. So she would go try to find them, meet up with other prop masters in the area and see if they had them. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Do you know who that fourth was? MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, I think her name was Jade. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Jade? MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. I was hoping for her to come more on set. But, yeah, they just hired her as a day player every now and then. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. So as far as -- and I know some of this that we've talked about before, some of it might be a little bit redundant. MS. GUTIERREZ: It's okay. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: But just trying to cover all bases. So, again, who provides the ammo?

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MS. GUTIERREZ: So as far as I'm concerned,

me and Sarah, we went together and we picked up the ammunition and all the weapons and my leathers from Seth Kenney in Albuquerque at his shop.

Yeah, we got two boxes of ammo I'm pretty sure that day. And then as we went on in the show, there were a couple of times that we needed more so Sarah and I would text him, you know, that we needed more. And, occasionally, Sarah brought in more ammo from Seth.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. Those two boxes that were originally supplied, were they blanks or dummies?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Originally supplied?

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: The ones that you

picked up two boxes of ammo?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Oh, yeah, so I think there were.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Would they give you like boxes like the white boxes?

MS. GUTIERREZ: No. They were -- they were like bigger boxes for sure.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah, no. A lot of them were -- there wasn't a lot of dummies in those really much at all. There were some dummies, you know, like

obscure dummies that we couldn't really get like the 50/70 rounds, you know. I don't know if you're familiar with those. Those are big rounds. They go in the trapdoor.

So we had some of those dummies with it.

But in terms of .45 long Colt dummies, I don't think

there was a lot of dummies in there and so I asked Seth

about it. And I said, hey, like where's all the long

Colt dummies? Because the .45, you know is -- .45 ammo

is like different than .45 long Colt, so we didn't

exactly -- I couldn't find that.

So I -- he told me to check the dummies that I had from the last show because he got me those ones and everything. And so I went back through a bag that I had. This bag has like a bunch of loose dummies in it, and I went through and I checked all of them and I put them into two boxes. And so we had two boxes of .45 long Colt dummies that were mine from the last show.

And mostly, I like to put the ones with no primer caps into the guns, you know, just to make everyone feel safe. And then for the other ones, those go in the belts, you know, and the ones that have the primer cap and the holes inside are good for both, really.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. And then -
MS. GUTIERREZ: And then for all the

loads -- yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: All right. So for all the blanks, all the quarters?

MS. GUTIERREZ: So there's eighth loads.

Those are the super, quietest ones, and I just worked with Ryan Armstrong that little 11-year-old on the Old Way, and I had her use those.

So, essentially, if it's someone that's really young and new with the guns, I'll make sure that they're the smallest load possible, which is an eighth.

Some horses require eighth loads. Most of the time, I'll put horse feed -- I'll put the box, and I'll put horsey rounds on them in my own handwriting so that way I know.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: And are those the eighths?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. Those are the eighths and then sometimes, you know, I will -- if it's super close proximity and inside eighths, too, but quarters also work for inside proximities that are close.

And then on top of that, for the quarters around kids, around horses, too, that's like the last size pretty much allowed and then we did the half loads if it's going into like a rifle or for outside like we did a lot of half loads on the show because a lot of it was outside.

And then for the full loads, it's very rare

MS. GUTIERREZ: So it really also depends on the actors, too. You know, like big ones like Nick Cage, if they tell me if -- or if they tell the director like, you know, that they don't really care to do it, I can try to teach them for the most part but like a lot of the times they might not even listen to me or really pay attention or be on their phone.

Alec was on his phone a lot of that entire thing but for the most part, they put me in training this time. It was pretty irregular how I trained actors this time. This time, they put nine people all together in one day.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: That I was supposed to train. And during this time, they put a ton of producers right there. Normally, I train the actors one on one. It makes them feel comfortable. It allows them to not be distracted and everything. And this time, they had me training three people at once and a ton of producers behind me, the director is there, too. The producers are talking to the actors. The actors were distracted even, too.

And I tried my best to work with all three of them. I worked with Jensen. You could probably see a video of him saying like, she showed me like this is how you check it. You know, this is how we make sure it's safe. So I try to do that standard same thing every time, show them how to check their own gun and show them how to make sure it's safe.

And then I always talk -- I have them draw it a few times, you know, with nothing in there, make sure that they have the draw down. Usually a little before that, I'll have them like just fire off a couple of quarter loads, you know, so they can get the idea of not drawing it from their thing but just holding it and firing it so they can get -- so they can understand what they're going to be doing.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: And then after that, we work on the actions that they're going to specifically do. So, you know, if I know that they have a scene in everything, we kind of talk it out together and like how they would: One, pull it out, what they could do, you know, how not to let it fall on the ground, how not to like let rocks get inside of it. Yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Makes sense.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Uh-huh.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: What about safety rules, do you advise them any of those?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Safety rules, such as? I tell them all the time not to point them at each other. That's my biggest one. And I always say to everyone in front of them, I'm like, if you don't have to be here, don't be here. You know, other than that safety-wise, I tell them to keep their finger out of the trigger guard unless they're ready to shoot because that's how a lot of accidental discharges will happen and that's just what my dad's told me, at least.

So I always try to advise them to keep their finger out of the trigger guard, and yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. Besides you, were there any other trained armorers on the set?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Sarah was kind of trained by Seth. Yeah. I believe Sarah did a show before, and I think that there were two guns involved in the show and Seth had trained her personally for that.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: And then I also kind of showed her what to do at the beginning of it to make sure that she wouldn't have an accidental discharge, but she still did so --

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah. So before any gun scene, even just like rehearsal or filming or anything of the sort, did they do a brief?

MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, sometimes -sometimes they would have time to like really go into
it and everything and like kind of, you know, work out
the action. Sometimes they would do like an overall
one. You know, where they kind of just say, like,
bang, bang, bang, bang. So we did have some rehearsals
sometimes. You know, there wasn't always rehearsals.

GUTIERREZ: Gonna hurt somebody. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: I love horses but --14 15 MS. GUTIERREZ: I don't like horses because of the westerns. Westerns have made me not like 16 17 horses. Horses and guns just suck. DETECTIVE HANCOCK: And are you a certified 18 firearms instructor? 19 20 MS. GUTIERREZ: I don't -- no. 21 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. I'm running to set trying to figure out what happened, and I walk up to set, and Sarah's like loading the guns and I'm like, hey. Like how's it going? And she's all like, oh, good. I was like what happened? She's like, nothing really. Can you load the one in there? And I say, okay. I'll go in there, and I'll load that one. Because I had been loading that Henry with that -- with that stuntman for guite some time now.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Probably like most of the day. So I go in there and I load it with him. I load that one with him and I tell him. All right. So I say -- I said, all right. You got about 13 quarter or half loads in there. I can't really remember what it was for that particular scene. That might have been --

the actors were outside so those were probably quarters.

So I tell him you have about 13 quarter loads in there, and he said, is there one in the chamber? And I said yes. And he said okay. And I said okay. So don't touch the trigger. And he was like okay.

And I walk out and then I go up to Sarah and I said hey, what happened? And she was like -- I was like I heard there was like a misfire, which is like the wrong terminology for it even. That's an accidental discharge.

So I was like I heard there was like a misfire or something. And she was like, oh, yeah, I was loading it -- and she's like, and it just went off. And I said -- because I had to train her how to do -- how to put them in and make sure that the hammer goes down gently enough.

Because I asked her if she knew how to do that from Seth, and she's like, yeah, but let me just do it again a couple of times in front of you. And I saw her do it and I was like, no, no. I was like put your thumb all the way over the trigger -- I mean, not the trigger, the hammer.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Uh-huh.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Otherwise, you know, if you don't put it all the way over, your hands will be sweaty sometimes and it'll slip. And so she was loading it, and I'm not exactly sure what happened.

Like I said, I was in the bathroom but guns don't just go off like that. And if you're loading it, it's most likely that you -- you made a mistake just loading it and that the hammer came down too quick.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: And, you know, when you're in a rush, that can happen. It hasn't happened to me, but I can understand it happening. And then as soon as that had happened, and I walked outside and I was asking her about that, next thing I know, boom inside of the fucking thing. And I already told them this gun was hot. I know for a fact I did, and we were doing that scene all day. So this man knows this gun is hot.

And then I go in there and I said, what the fuck are you doing in here? And he tells me -- he's like I don't know. It just went off. And I was like, well, it's a leather action rifle and that's not really how that works, bud, you know.

So pissed him off a little bit. But I said, all right. Be careful in here. Thankfully, we were doing that scene pretty much all day, so I think a

lot of camera had their earplugs in but --1 2 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: It was inside when it 3 went off then? MS. GUTIERREZ: It was inside of this, 4 5 yeah, little shack that they were in and most of the 6 camera crew was in there at the time. 7 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. 8 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. So that one was 9 inside and then there was also a popper misfire with special effects. 10 11 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. 12 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. And that was -- that 13 was the day -- that was the day that we first started 14 shooting and everything. We didn't -- we had pretty good luck with that. And I'm -- there were two that like could have been shaken. So I'm shaking them both as I walk in. And I walk in and I put the four no prime -- the four no primers in there and then I like look at my hand and I notice there's one with a hole in the side so I use that one next.

And then I try to put one of the ones that is shook in there but it won't go in. And so at that point, I showed Dave, I leave that one out because I notice like that needs to be cleaned. So I leave it out, I move -- I move the cylinder to a location where you wouldn't notice that that one wasn't in there.

I thought that more actors were coming in later, and I would train them as the show went on but then Joel called me and Joel was like, no, we need to train like all the actors. They're going to be there that first week and I said okay. So, yeah, they set up a training day.

But I was trying to get them in from like the very get-go.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: But, I mean, the statement was that you fought for training days?

MS. GUTIERREZ: I did.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: So --

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. I -- I was always pretty much arguing with Gabrielle and for him -- because at first, they didn't even want to have the training day, you know. So --

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: So you were expecting people to do?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. No. They literally did not want to have that training day at first and they told me it wasn't necessary. And then after Joel called me, Joel told them like, no, don't be stupid. You guys need to have these people trained. Joel

1 like -- that happens all the time with directors and
2 producers.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Uh-huh. So Joel pretty much --

MS. GUTIERREZ: Joel --

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: -- overruled them

saying no?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. J -- Joel was like no. Like, you know, they were -- they didn't want to pay the money for it. Joel was like, you pay for the money for it. But, yeah, so they didn't want to have that day originally and then the -- the training day that I fought for that I was trying to fight for was the one with Alec after our training day.

So after I had trained with Alec, Alec was the only actor I trained that day. And I was thankfully able to step away from props for a little bit in order to train Alec that day at the church and we practiced some of his stuff.

Other than that, he was really distracted, he was on the phone a lot, and he wasn't -- his holster wasn't available for him to practice with that day.

So I told him the next day, we should practice with the holster. And he said, yeah. I agree. I will see you tomorrow. I'm also riding

horses tomorrow, so we'll do that, too, and I said okay. Cool.

And I told Gabrielle, and Gabrielle was all like -- Gabrielle was, basically, like I'll handle Alec's. Because, you know, Alec is a producer, kind of does whatever he wants, and so the other producers have to reel him in all the time.

So for him to ask for another armorer day, which is only like 60 more dollars -- for him to ask for another armorer day, they were trying to like axe my head.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Don't do it.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Did you ever put any of this in writing? Or emails? Or text messages?

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. There's a lot of -it's a lot of text between me and Gabrielle. But other
than that, mostly the next morning when he was supposed
to show up for his lesson, he comes to set, doesn't
really say anything about his lesson. The producers
are telling me like, you know, no. Like we don't want
him doing this lesson this day.

I had already talked to them about it, and I said he needs to practice -- and I was telling Nathan and Nathan was like you called it. I said he needs to

practice with his holster; otherwise, he might like, honestly, shoot himself in the arm. Or get really pissed off and have a whole ass hissy fit and it happened actually a little after that. And Nathan was like you called it, and I said, yeah, I did.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: What happened?

MS. GUTIERREZ: He tried to pull from his holster, it got caught on his microphone, and he got so pissed and threw a big ass hissy fit and started bitching at sound. Thankfully, I didn't get that. I didn't get the lashing, you know.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah.

MS. GUTIERREZ: But, yeah, so the next -MR. BOWLES: There's emails we can -DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Yeah.

MS. GUTIERREZ: We can show you those. The next morn -- yeah, the next morning, Sarah had to leave set. Sarah had to leave set all day. Sarah was sick as a dog, as well, and Sarah was leaving set to go get shit done including some other stuff like with the knives and the knife hole -- holster and all this stuff.

So it's just me running the stuff on set with Nicole on a very prop, heavy day. And props includes food and everything. Just so you know.

So we had to a whole table scene that we had to do with just two people, which is manageable but also like I was also training the actor with that gun while they're doing it. You know, like just the girl. She wasn't shooting it or anything but they decided randomly that they wanted to have her have a gun.

So I didn't get paid for armorer that day either. I'm working two jobs, and I was supposed to give lessons to Alec that day, but ultimately, could not. Because, one, he didn't show up. Two, the producers wouldn't let him, and then, three, I had to stay on set and work with the fricking food.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. But he had agreed to do that with you and then it was kind of shut down by others?

MS. GUTIERREZ: He said, I will see you tomorrow. And then I also got -- I think it was a little after that, a couple days after that where I texted his assistant. And I said, hey, you know, does -- does he need any more work with this? Like how is he feeling about that? And he's like hasn't expressed anything to me, but I'll let him know that you asked.

DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay.

MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. So I had tried to

1 possibly work with Alec more after that. 2 DETECTIVE HANCOCK: Okay. 3 MS. GUTIERREZ: So those are like the training days I kind of fought for. MONTOYA: I see. So now can you tell us what does a prop 8 assistant do? 9 MS. GUTIERREZ: So I'm still not really 10 entirely sure about that. I kind of just got thrown 11 12 into this prop assistant role on this one. I thought I was doing an okay job. I was told 13 by my superiors that I needed to work harder on 14 15 supporting props. So basically, I guess, what they told me, at least, is that I need to just be an on set force 16 17 as supporting props and your job is to give actors 18 anything that they use in a scene. 19 So if they pick it up, if they bite it, if 20 they eat it, if they use it, it's a prop, and our job is 21 to give them said props, and to make sure that they have it on in the scene, and to dress props into scenes, as 22 23 well. And that includes guns, too, for armorers. They need to be dressed into scenes most of the time, as 24 25 well.

1 And other than that, I think that's all I 2 really do as a prop assistant. 3 MR. MONTOYA: Okay. Appreciate it. So how much background, experience -- how long 4 5 have you been working as an armorer, and have you ever worked as a props assistant before, or was this sort of 7 the first time they kind of -- you had that little extra job? 8 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. No. So for this one, 9 because I was hired on a union show, what I was told by 10 the production, the line producer, was that in order to 11 12 hire an armorer that wasn't technically in IATSE, our union -- which, by the way, I'm only like two days away 13 from being in the union -- but in order to technically 14 hire me, they would have needed to hire me as an 15 16 assistant props person. 17 And when they told me that, I assumed it was more like, you know, okay, like, quote, unquote, "You're 18 19 assistant props, but really you're doing the guns." But 20 they informed me that I needed to be doing both. this time -- this is the first time I've ever done 21 22 assistant props. 23 And previous to this I mostly worked -- I only really started working as an armorer on the shows back 24 in March with Murder at Emigrant Gulch. 25 And then a

1 little after summer I did The Old Way as head armorer rather than an armorer assistant. 2 And before that I also worked with my dad a 3 little bit, assisting him with some guns on a -- Once 4 5 Upon a Time in Hollywood. But I wasn't really too focused on the guns in that. I was mostly a production 7 assistant. And other than that, that -- like officially 8 assistant armorer in March. Yeah. 9 MR. MONTOYA: I see. 10 And let me ask you, who -- who was it who 11 12 hired you directly? Was it just the line producer, or did you actually have to talk to -- to others, as well? 13 MS. GUTIERREZ: I didn't talk to really 14 15 Seth -- Seth Kenney, he was providing the guns anybody. 16 and ammunition for the show. Usually a teamster will come over and 6 help us with that. 7 So most days we would leave, and normally like other prop masters I've worked with would lock up 8 their -- their truck and everything. I don't believe it was 15 16 a separate paper attached, just right underneath what we 17 were doing that day in large letters. I did. 10 I cleaned that 11 one that day. 12 And actually he kind of almost chose a different one other than that one, and I simply made 13 that one kind of look like the other one, because I knew 14 that his ran better, like his -- I was pulling the 15 action on it. That means basically you're pulling the 16 17 hammer and dropping it, pulling the hammer and dropping 18 it repeatedly, to make sure like, oh, does it jam every 19 five, or does it jam every 10. So I did it probably 20 about 50 times. And his gun that I -- that I assigned him was the most reliable and the safest one. 21 MR. MONTOYA: I see. 22 23 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. So I did clean that 24 I found it to be very standard in all of its mechanical operations, and I found it to be better than 25

28 1 the other option he had. So I just went ahead and I switched it, and I didn't let him know. 2 3 MR. MONTOYA: Okay. So no mechanical defects. 4 The other option noted. Okay. 5 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. 6 MR. MONTOYA: Let me also ask, do you happen 7 to know off the top of your head, or maybe you have it written down, what day this maintenance day was on? 8 MS. GUTIERREZ: Da-da-da. I don't have it 9 on the top of my head, but it's also right here in 10 these -- in these text messages. So if I find it, I 11 12 will send it to you. 13 MR. MONTOYA: Okay. Thank you. So -- all right. Did you -- so, of course, 14 you said his gun was, you know, very reliable and the 15 like. You had to send one gun back to Seth because the 16 17 hammer kept getting stuck. Were there any other sort of defects that you 18 19 noticed with these firearms that were workable, but they 20 were notable, such as hammers slipping or sensitive 21 triggers? 22 MS. GUTIERREZ: You know, no, I never really 23 saw any sensitive -- I never saw any sensitive triggers 24 on this by any means. Usually we -- in the -- in the

industry it's standard to not make them hair triggers,

It was right after the show and tell. And the other 24 really annoying thing about it was they had maybe 15 25

1 producers standing right behind me while this is all 2 happening, talking, being distracting really, and also 3 distracting actors frequently. But other than that, I still tried to work 4 5 with the actors to the best of my abilities, despite how many of them I was working with at the same time. 7 trained Jensen Ackles. He was one of the characters on that. I trained him pretty well. 8 I like to train all of them ideally on how to 9 open the gun, check the gun, reload the gun, make sure 10 the qun is safe. I like to make sure that they know how 11 12 to do that and everything. And so that way -- because, you know, they're all supposed to be experienced law 13 men, they should know their gun inside and out. 14 15 The only one that wasn't at that meeting per se was Alec. And Alec and I, we had ours in the church 16 17 actually where the incident happened. He -- he claimed it was an hour-and-a-half, and, yeah, it's true that 18 19 Mr. Baldwin and I were together for an hour-and-a-half, 20 but this happens a lot with bigger celebrities. They 21 kind of just push off my recommendations and my 22 suggestions for training. 23 So I went in there, and I went to go do the 24 same thing I showed for like Jensen Ackles and Devon Werkheiser, where I taught them how to open the gun, how 25

32 1 to check it for safety and everything. And I told 2 him -- I was like "All right. We're going to start with 3 some quarter loads, and I'm going to show you how to open this and everything." 4 5 And he said "Yeah, yeah, yeah. Just load it with the most realistic looking ones, and we'll shoot it 6 7 a few times." And I said "Okay. That's how this is going to - 8 9 qo, I quess." And he was kind of distracted by his family on 10 FaceTime and all that, and he was calling his ex-wife at 11 12 the time. So we also had to wait to get the full loads, 13 because normally I never train actors with full loads, 14 as that can be a bit of a sticky situation, but he 15 didn't have his holster that day. So I was like 16 17 whatever, he's not going to be pulling it out from his side, because that could be dangerous, so he's just 18 19 holding it out in front of him. I was like by all 20 means, yeah, he can shoot fulls in this case. 21 So we had to wait a little bit for my 22 assistant to bring the full load blanks to me and Alec. 23 So that probably -- and along with him talking to his 24 family took about 20 minutes out of it, maybe 30 minutes out of it. 25

33 1 We did shoot it a couple times. I did try to 2 tell him a couple things about not putting his finger on the trigger until he's ready to shoot, keeping it out of 3 the trigger guard, as we call it, for safety purposes. 4 - 5 I train children especially with that, because you don't want them to accidentally touch it. It's not a big 6 7 action to pull that trigger, by any means. So I did try to tell him to keep his finger out of the trigger and - 8 9 just to really aim at his target. He ended up getting -- he ended up trying to 10 11 like make Instagram videos or like some type of social 12 media videos during our lesson. So yeah. He didn't get to work with the holster, and he also was pretty 13 distracted during our entire lesson. 14 MR. MONTOYA: I see. 15 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. If you would like me to 16 17 go into other acting with other trainers -- with other actors or whatever, I'm more than willing, but I don't 18 19 know how much of it pertains. 20 MR. MONTOYA: Right. But other than that, I'm -- I was told that she contacted the producers, and no one said anything after that, and -- yeah. No. I'm still pretty shocked that no one said anything about that. If they did or if they -- anyone talked to production about it, it was not addressed to me.

MR. MONTOYA: All right. So -- got all those.

1 All right. I'm going to ask just a quick sort 2 of statistical question. Estimate off the top of your head, it's a total guess, if you have to guess how many 3 4 people were on set, where the guns are on set, not 5 necessarily at base camp, on any given day, how many people would you have to estimate might be there, you 7 know, if you have 30 on a lot of shooting or you have five on a quiet dialogue scene? Is there an average, 8 somewhere in between? 9 10 MS. GUTIERREZ: Oh. Ah, okay. You know, some -- it really all just depends on how big the area 11 12 is and what the set is. Typically for really small sets there would be five people in there. For medium sets 13 you still have people going in and out along with 14 background actors, so I would assume anywhere from --15 it's the pretty big number range right here. And it 16 17 also just depends on the movie, too. Probably like at least 50 people to 150, depend -- also, you know, with 18 19 background extras, you know, just how big the gun scenes 20 are, who's around in the vicinity, because for crew I 21 would say probably 50 to 100. Yeah. 22 MR. MONTOYA: Appreciate it. I know that's a 23 hard guess, but just --24 MS. GUTIERREZ: Yeah. No. It always just 25 varies, and usually how it varies is the setting. Ιf

So I went to Dave, and I showed him all of these guns were clear. We had about two shotguns out at the time, several pistols, a rifle. I had cleared all of those with Dave, and the characters kept them on most of the day.

Shooting didn't resume right at like 6:30, how it normally does, because I was like sitting there, and I was like, well, what's going on? Like why -- why aren't we shooting? And I found out that the camera crew had quit that day. So we all had to sit there for approximately like an hour, maybe even two, while the new camera crew figured out how to put their cameras

together and everything.

So we were all just chilling out there. I don't think really any of the actors -- the actors were like gunned up and everything, but they were all staying close, and we were all just ready to go.

Sarah, Nicole and I were just kind of talking amongst ourselves and just kind of generally watching the guns and all of that. Eventually we did start shooting. I can't remember exactly what time, but it was very late in the day. So things were moving fast.

And then we got done with all of that scene finally. I won't go into it too much, because it's not really super relevant or anything.

But then we went out to the scene later on, which was at the church. So we pushed our janky cart all the way up the hill to the church, and we all got ready and everything. A lot of the guns that were working in previous scene were working in this scene.

So a lot of the actors just kept their guns on except for when they went back to base camp, in which I collected the guns, because I don't like them to go back to base camp with them or leave set with them.

And then so we were sitting there that day, just kind of going through the motions and getting everybody's anticipation shots set up, where they like

1 enter the church, you know. Like Rust is in the church.
2 Alec Baldwin's character is already in the church.

And there were a couple times where I knew
that the guns were out and that they were pointed at the
camera. So Sarah, Nicole and -- Sarah and I, we dummied
up the guns together. She did Jensen Ackles'. I did
Alec's. And I think -- I think I did Woods', as well.
But -- so we dummied them up and everything with mostly
no primer ones.

And then so I had four no primer ones. Those like have no back on them. So, you know, they can't go off, and they have a hole in the side. And then I was like walking in, about to put a fifth one in, and then I saw that I had one with a hole in the side. So I used that one. So those ones don't shake, essentially. So I didn't shake that one, because it had a hole in the side.

I put the fifth one in, and then I tried to put a sixth one in that also had a hole in it. But it did not -- it did not go in there, basically. Alec Baldwin's gun was dirty due to the whole maintenancing issue I had talked about. So I was like, okay, I'll just kind of hide this thing, and as long as he doesn't pull the hammer back or anything, it won't show.

So we left it like that. We had all them

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1 dummied up before lunch. Nothing went awry. No one was 2 cocking anything. Alec had kept his gun on him most of the day 3 for the most part, which was kind of strange, because 4 5 normally he hands it off to me pretty regularly. 6 I was outside of the -- we were set up outside 7 of the church, probably about 20 feet if you stepped out of the doors to the left. That's where our cart was. So we could kind of watch the entrance and everything 9 and be close by. But we couldn't be in the church due 10 to COVID issues and the camera crew moving around 11 12 regularly. It's just not really possible at the time. So lunch had -- lunch had came to, and we 13 collected all the guns, and we went and locked up the 14 15
